<u>The Carlton Junior Academy – Catch Up Premium Plan</u> <u>2020/2021</u> Updated June 2021

Following the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequent closure of schools, the government issued an amount of catch-up funding to all schools to support with closing gaps in learning. The amount of funding allocated is based on pupil numbers and is paid over two financial years.

At The Carlton Junior Academy we are receiving:

£80 per pupil (Year 3 – Year 6)

233 children x £80 = **£18,640**

At The Carlton Junior Academy, we have used the government recommended, 'COVID-19 Support Guide for Schools' published by the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) to identify the best strategies, based on long term research, that will enable us to achieve the most positive outcomes.

We have considered teaching and whole school strategies, targeted approaches and wider strategies.
